Creating a High Performing Board in a Post Reform World

Maureen M. Swan, MHA, President, MedTrend, Inc. - Eden Prairie, MN

This keynote presentation focuses on the key elements of a high performing board, the board competencies that healthcare reform and payment change introduces, and provides a model for assessing and improving a board's performance to ensure organizational success in the new world of healthcare.

Trustee Toolkit Experience

Lanny Kope, EdD, Sierra Vista Regional Health Center - Sierra Vista, AZ and Penny Brooke, APRN, MS, JD, University of Utah College of Nursing - Salt Lake City, UT

Created for trustees serving in their first term as a hospital trustee, the Trustee Toolkit workshop is designed to help beginning trustees understand the various governance and financial aspects of healthcare. The workshop is organized in three parts: (A) Fundamentals of being a hospital trustee; (B) Hospital finance, which is directed towards developing an awareness of how hospitals are financed; and (C) Regulatory aspects of hospitals, which encompasses the various regulatory issues with which hospital trustees must deal, as well as the resources available to assist them in this endeavor.

Lanny A. Kope has been active in healthcare governance for over 30 years. Dr. Kope held leadership responsibilities at the national and regional levels, as chairman of American Hospital Association's (AHA) Committee on Governance and AHA's Leadership Development Committee. He currently serves as board chair for Sierra Vista Hospital.

Penny S. Brooke is both an advance practice nurse and an attorney. She is also a professor at the University of Utah College of Nursing, is licensed as a psychiatric nurse specialist and consults/speaks nationally and internationally on nursing standards of care. She is chairperson of the AHA Committee on Governance and has served on the AHA Leadership Development Committee since 2009, as well as the AHA Task Force on Healthcare Reform Payment Plans.

Session 1 – Health Reform and the Decline of Physician Private Practice

Kurt Mosley, VP, Strategic Alliances, Merritt Hawkins - Irving, TX

How will health reform affect the way physicians practice in the United States? What practice models are likely to be most prevalent in the post-reform era? How will health reform affect physician supply and demand, and how can hospitals, medical groups and others extend the physician workforce? Merritt Hawkins, the nation's leading physician search and consulting firm, was commissioned by The Physicians Foundation to provide answers to these and related questions. In this presentation, Mr. Mosley will reveal the findings of the report in a timely and dynamic presentation that gets to the heart of how healthcare reform will transform the way physicians practice in America.

Kurt Mosley, VP, Strategic Alliances, Merritt Hawkins and its parent company, AMN Healthcare (Irving, TX), has over 20 years of healthcare staffing and consulting experience, and addresses dozens of healthcare professional organizations each year. Cited by Reach MD-SM Radio, *U.S. News & World Report, USA Today, Modern Healthcare,* Association of Health Care Journalists, American College of Healthcare Executives and many other sources, Mr. Mosley is nationally recognized for his healthcare staffing expertise.

Session 2 – Creating an Exceptional Patient Experience: University of Utah Healthcare Approach

Chrissy Daniels, MS, Director, Exceptional Patient Experience, University of Utah Health Care - Salt Lake City, UT

University of Utah Health Care is a nationally recognized improver in patient satisfaction, but that came after years of trial and error. Their time-tested approach focuses on leaders who create a culture of alignment, transparency and accountability with a focus on innovation at the bedside. In this session, Ms. Daniels will balance culture and strategy with real tools that any hospital can use to improve their experience.

Chrissy Daniels has led ambulatory care practices, ancillary services and support services, and has served as the project director for \$180 million of construction during the last 20 years. For the past decade, she has been focused on her passion patient satisfaction. During the past five years, University of Utah Health Care has been nationally recognized as a top improver and performer. Ms. Daniels has partnered with physicians, nurses, ancillary and support staff to dramatically improve results in patient satisfaction.

Session 3 – What Board Members Need to Know About Quality and Performance

Michael D. Pugh, Managing Director, Verisma[®] Consulting -Pueblo, CO

In this session, Michael Pugh will review the governing board's responsibility for clinical and patient outcomes. He will provide useful examples of governance structures for setting quality goals and how boards should look at data and monitor performance.

Michael Pugh has over 30 years of CEO experience in hospitals, healthcare systems, managed care organizations, consulting and healthcare services companies. Mr. Pugh is a nationally known consultant to healthcare organizations, payer organizations and government agencies focusing on issues of quality, performance, strategy and governance. He has been active in healthcare leadership and has served on the boards of the American Hospital Association (AHA), AHA Health Forum, Colorado Hospital Association and The Joint Commission. Pugh is a senior faculty member of the Institute of Healthcare Improvement and is a frequent speaker on subjects of leadership, governance, strategy and quality.

Session 4 – Affiliations: Everyone Is Doing It, But Is It Right for Us?

Brian R. Haapala, FACHE, Managing Director, Stroudwater Associates - Portland, ME

Rural hospital boards across the country are seeing affiliations forming. Many rural hospitals have viewed affiliations as a threat, while others have considered it a means to adapt to the changing market and ensure continued local delivery of high quality care in communities. It is not for everyone. This session will discuss a number of potential affiliation structures along an integration continuum, how each structure works and their success factors and—more importantly—how to approach potential partners from a position of strength. Each topic will be viewed through a rural lens, highlighting the unique challenges that rural communities face when approaching affiliations.

Brian Haapala is passionate about finding solutions to improve healthcare despite increasingly limited resources. Mr. Haapala has been in healthcare for 18 years, including 14 years as an advisor to hospitals and health systems in affiliation planning, facility strategies and financing. Quantifying the Impact Leadership and Culture Have on Organizational Performance Outcomes

Tom Olivo, President, Success Profiles, Inc. - Bozeman, MT

What business practice most assures success? Getting the right people in the right roles is considered to be one of the most important core competencies of an executive in business today. This competency is referred to as getting "leadership alignment." This presentation will feature using business analytics to better understand and illustrate the impact that leadership ability has on overall performance; reviewing best practices and evidence measured to date; and taking inventory with your own maturity and sophistication with these practices to identify areas of deficiency, your priorities and potential for upside improvement.

Tom Olivo has presented over 500 keynote speeches, executive workshops and board retreats at over 240 healthcare systems nationwide, as well as healthcare conferences and symposiums. Mr. Olivo features innovative measurement tools and shares case study data and research providing healthcare executives with an exceptional amount of value that translates into actionable strategies. Session 5 – Talent Management, Leadership Continuity and Succession Planning

Tom Olivo, President, Success Profiles, Inc. - Bozeman, MT

The business case and need for leadership continuity: There are a number of converging demographic, industry, marketplace and business factors that are creating a condition that we have labeled as "the impending leadership void." Within the healthcare sector (specifically hospitals) in the United States, approximately 83 percent of people appointed to a leadership and/or management position fall within the age cohort of 35 to 55 years of age.

Where we're going with the competition for leadership

talent: In 2015 (just 3 years), we will begin to enter a phase of intense competition for leaders and managers that fall in the age cohort of 30 to 50. By the time we hit 2020 (in 8 years), all organizations in the U.S. will be competing for the same seasoned leaders and managers between the ages of 35 and 55. Organizations without a mature, structured approach to manage these business practices will be at a significant competitive disadvantage.

Developing a core competency: Talent management, leadership continuity and succession planning are not "high tech" software solutions or web-enabled "apps" to solve leadership challenges. Instead, they are "high touch" core leadership competencies that are vital to producing consistent high performance.

Session 6 – Access to Capital in an Era of Reform

Matthew Lindsay, Regional Vice President, Lancaster Pollard - Columbus, OH

Constantly changing market factors and an uncertain regulatory environment have resulted in various collaborations between healthcare providers in an effort to access affordable capital. Healthcare facilities that plan to issue debt or otherwise borrow money to finance expansions, renovations or new construction must understand what these factors are and how to monitor them in order to choose the most cost-effective financing option. Financing options covered include taxable and tax-exempt bonds, FHA Section 242, USDA and additional capital provided by systems or other healthcare partners. Understanding these market factors can help healthcare leaders identify market opportunities and implications before they pursue financing or affiliation. This presentation reviews market factors from a banking perspective in the context of available healthcare financing options. Attendees will leave with a more thorough understanding of the municipal markets and how healthcare providers are perceived in the marketplace.

Matthew Lindsay is the senior banker responsible for the firm's Rocky Mountain and Pacific Northwest activities. Since joining the firm, Mr. Lindsay has focused his efforts on community healthcare and senior living, structuring a range of bond transactions and mortgage loans for expansion, new construction and refinance projects.

Session 7 – Making the Most of Your Current Board

Johnathan Johnson, Vice President, Business Development, QHR - Brentwood, TN

Build on the expertise of your current board and plan for the future. Ensure that you have the strongest board possible to govern your hospital. Now more than ever, having the right talent and expertise on the board is vital to your hospital's success. Learn what your peers are saying about succession planning, managing elected/appointed board changes, board member recruitment and the challenges facing board leaders. Find out what you can do to help make the most of your current board and plan for its future.

Mr. Johnson is responsible for supervising 15 hospital client relationships in Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Alaska and Washington. His hospital clients represent more than \$610 million in hospital revenue. As a former registered nurse, Mr. Johnson offers both operational and clinical expertise to his clients' challenges. For 15 years, he served as CEO of Valley View Hospital in Glenwood Springs, CO.

Session 8 – Intentional Governance

Sean Patrick Murphy, Esq., Sr. Vice President and General Counsel, JFK Health System - Edison, NJ

Hospitals and health systems are challenged on every front: enormous regulatory and public scrutiny, finances and inadequate reimbursement, and the demand for high-quality patient care. If good governance truly is more than a haphazard collection of governance practices, if "high-performing boards" are truly culture-driven teams, then they need to do what every good team and athlete does: learn, grow and improve. A governing board's primary responsibility is one of oversight—reviewing and analyzing the organization's processes and performance. In order to conduct this important job of oversight, the board must also look critically at itself, its own culture and performance, and ensure the board is functioning at its peak, so it can truly focus on the real work of governing. This presentation focuses on board dynamics and culture, and intentional governance: a deliberate and intentional process that enables boards to realize their highest potential.

Sean Patrick Murphy is also a senior fellow at the Jefferson University School of Population Health, Philadelphia, PA and a member of the expert faculty of the Governance Institute, San Diego, CA. He lectures and writes extensively in healthcare and health law.

Session 9 – Governing Boards and the Challenges They Face - Parts 1 & 2

Ann G. Macfarlane, PRP, CAE, President, Jurassic Parliament - Seattle, WA

Part I

Hospital boards of directors and elected hospital district commissioners encounter increasing challenges today as our society becomes more diverse and more polarized. Tough economic and structural issues face all our organizations, and when directors or commissioners have different agendas, political views, or personalities, it can be difficult to work together effectively. This session will present a framework for handling discussion, debate and decision-making that is fair, efficient and easy to apply. It is based on *Robert's Rules of Order* as adapted to modern conditions. Attendees will take away a few simple principles, techniques and insights that can make all the difference to their meetings.

Part 2

This session will give attendees the opportunity to practice making proposals, discussing them, and voting on them in an interactive exercise. It is open to all registrants – attendance at part I is not required to participate. The session will demonstrate how to deal with obstructive, contrary or confused colleagues and the public with power and compassion. Being clear about the authority that the chair and the members possess will enable board directors and elected commissioners to deal with their challenges and conduct business effectively for their hospital or district.


Big Sky, Big Fun

Tim McDonald

Crossing the Patient Safety/Medical Liability Chasm

Timothy B. McDonald, MD, JD, University of Illinois Medical Center - Chicago, IL

Dr. Timothy B. McDonald will explain how organizations can link culture change and improvements in patient safety to decreased harm and decreased liability.

Dr. McDonald is a physician-attorney who has been involved in patient safety efforts at the University of Illinois Medical Center for the past decade. Until his recent promotion to chief safety and risk officer for the entire University of Illinois at Chicago, Dr. McDonald served as the program director for the pediatric anesthesiology residency program. His focus has been on the principled approach to patient harm with an emphasis on the robust reporting of patient safety events, near misses and unsafe conditions. He has helped pioneer the medical center's resident physician reporting process as a means of engaging resident physicians from all specialties in safety and quality education. The principled approach to patient harm also includes a commitment to communicate within the healthcare team and with patients and families throughout the therapeutic relationship. It also involves a promise to investigate and create systems improvement following harm or near miss events. Dr. McDonald's federally funded research has focused on all of these domains, including the establishment of teaching methodologies for all levels and professions in healthcare.

This session will provide a comprehensive federal perspective on the state of healthcare in America and pending legislation that will impact our nation's hospitals. Mike Rock worked on Capitol Hill as staff assistant to U.S. Senator Roman Hruska from 1975 to 1977. He served as legislative assistant to U.S. Representative Charles Thone from 1977 until 1978, when Thone was elected governor of Nebraska. From January 1979 to November 1984, Mr. Rock was legislative staff director to U.S. Representative Virginia Smith. Mr. Rock joined the American Hospital Association as a lobbyist in December 1984. He has covered the Budget and Appropriations Committees of both Houses, the House Commerce Committee and the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions. He is currently responsible for the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee, specializing in Medicare, taxes, capital financing and health system reform issues.
