Standard Level:

• Standard level deficiencies are deficient practices that pose low threat to health and safety. Must be resolved with in 60 calendar days from the date of survey.

Condition Level:

- Condition level deficiencies are deficient practices that pose a serious threat to health and safety. Must be resolved within 45 calendar days from the date of survey.
- Multiple standard level deficiencies could lead to a CONDITION level citation.

Immediate Jeopardy:

• Immediate Jeopardy is an immediate threat to health or safety and requires immediate attention and resolution.



Medication Vials



Single dose vials being utilized as a Multi dose vial.

Single and Multi dose vials found stored past the manufacturer printed expiration date.

Open Multi dose vials stored past the 28 day Beyond Use Date.



Sterilization of Instruments



- The clinic is not following their process for handling and sterilization of non-disposable instruments.
- The clinic is not following the MFU for the autoclave.
- The clinic is not following their policy for accepting sterilized instruments from the hospital or other outside source.
- Cold sterilization is not acceptable.



Patient Care Equipment

- Patient care equipment is not checked according to manufacturers instructions for use.
- Exam bed covers have frayed corners or tears in the cover.
- Broken or obsolete equipment not labeled "Do Not Use".
- Patient care items stored directly on the floor.



Point of Care Tests



- Clinic does not have the ability to perform all 6 required point of care tests.
- Most common tests the clinic is unable to perform are:
- o Hemoglobin or Hematocrit
- o Blood Glucose
- Testing for occult Blood in the stool
- All reagents, strips, controls, etc., must be in date.



Emergency Services

- A list of medications approved by the Medical Director and NP or PA is missing from clinic policy.
- Approved medications are missing from the emergency medication kit.
- Expired medication and supplies found in the emergency medication kit.
- No emergency medication kit found in the clinic.
